## PEACE IN SERBIA

MINISTER TUDOROVICS DIES FROM HIS WOUNDS—THE ELECTION OF PETER KARAGEORGEVITCH AS KING REGARDED AS CERTAIN AND THE POWERS WILL RECOGNIZE THE CHOICE OF THE SERBIANS.

BELGRADE, June 13.—Minister Tudorovics has died as a result of his wounds received at the time of the assassination of the King and Queen. Peace reign here and no disturbances are anticipated now. The election of Peter Karageorgevitch as king is regarded as certain.

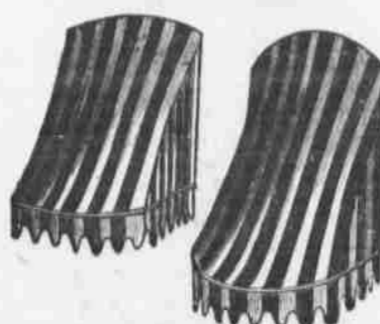

## ALL HAOLE'S ARE BARRED

HOME RULERS HOLD THEIR MAUI CONVENTION AND LUAU—LUAU ATTENDED BY QUEEN ANU NUMEROUS PROMINENT HOME RULERS ON ISLANDS—NUMEROUS SPEECHES MADE BY NATIVE ORATORS.

The Home Rule party held its big luau at Wailuku Thursday. The event was attended by all varieties of members of the native party. Men women and children were there. A few Pakes were among those present as were some Japs. Few white people attended the glorious event.

Taking instinctively, their cue from the Home Rule "leader" of the House, the party placed itself strongly on record as anti-haole. In fact, the party declared that it was agin' the white devil. The party decided that no white man was to be elected to office in the County of Maui on a Home Rule ticket. If other parties might desire to put the white man on their ticket all well and good, but the Home Rule party proposed to draw the color line strictly.

The usual line of Home Rule oratory was enjoyed by the speakers. The usual spels were given, the usual play on the prejudices made. Robert W. Wilcox was present. He spoke. Other Home Rulers were also present. Princess Theresa occupied her accustomed prominent place as vivandiere to the Home Rule party.

Liliuokalani attended the luau. Everybody had a fine time. It was a glorious event in the annals of Maui history.

Oily Bill White was nominated for sheriff. All of the nominees for other offices were natives.

## VERDICT OF MURDER SET ASIDE

JUDGE HARDY IN CHARGING THE JURY GAVE A SYNOPSIS OF THE EVIDENCE FOR THE PROSECUTION BUT DID NOT MENTION THE EVIDENCE FOR THE DEFENSE—THIS IS HELD TO BE ERROR.

The conviction of Yoshikawa Dengiro, of murder in the first degree, was set aside by the Supreme Court this morning. The defendant was alleged to have killed his foster father, at Kapaa, Kauai, on May 26, 1902. The dead man was literally shot to pieces, eight or nine bullet wounds being found on his person.

The verdict is set aside on account of alleged error by Judge Hardy, who, in giving a summary of the evidence gave only that of the prosecution, in charging the jury. The syllabus says:

"The court in the charge to the jury gave a synopsis of the evidence offered by the prosecution without referring in any way to the evidence for the defendant. Held, that this was error for which a verdict of conviction should be set aside and a new trial ordered."

In the case of Chee Kit vs. Lee Lung, assault and battery, the verdict is also set aside, on account of errors during trial. The trouble grew out of a dispute over Manoa valley water rights.

Another decision was handed down in the case of the Territory vs. Aki, appealed from the Fourth Circuit. Judge Little is sustained in dismissing an appeal from the District Court of Hilo, the appeal papers not having been perfected.

## THE JAP, THE RUSSIAN, AND THE SMILING JAG

THE RUSSIAN CHARGED THE JAP WITH ASSAULT ON THE HIGH SEAS—THE PRINCIPAL WITNESS APPEARED WITH A SMILING JAG—ITS INFECTIOUS JOY BROUGHT ABOUT GENERAL AMNESTY.

Frank, Japanese cook of the ship Hawaiian Isles, which recently arrived here from New York, was placed on hearing this morning before United States Commissioner Douthitt, on a charge of assault and battery on the high seas, preferred by John Keinenen, able seaman, who swore that the cook chased him with a knife and a "glubb," the latter instrument proving to be the potato-masher. Keinenen is a husky Russian, who seemed to be trying to Russianize the English language on the witness stand. His story of an assault was confirmed by the captain.

"Id vas darkk night dat morning," said the Russian. "I vas vorking ven he come tbb ad der bayk and hid me vid dat glubb on der front ouf der hedd. Blude run over my eye I cannod run. He gome older me say 'I gill you, I gill you.'"

Many interruptions were necessary in eliciting Keinenen's story, but it all came out by degrees. A dozen sailors of assorted races and wondrous-shaped heads gathered to see the trouble out and after listening to a lot of them the Commissioner ordered Frank discharged.

Fred Campbell, who was summoned to testify for the prosecution, proved to be non compos. Campbell came into court wearing a happy smile and a large jag. He smiled at the court, Attorney Breckons and Marshal Hendry, lurched over the witness stand and almost enoed by falling down. He was ordered out as unfit to testify and carried his smile and his jag with him as he went. He is said to have taken the "glubb" away from Frank when the trouble occurred.

"The case is too trivial," said the Commissioner in dismissing the charge.

## MAY ACT IN SUMNER CASE

Supreme Court Will Meet Next Week and Will Hear From Attorney General Andrews.

Attorney General Andrews has finished his examination of the Sumner case record, which was referred to him by Chief Justice Frear, for such action as he might deem advisable regarding the charges which the various attorneys in the case made against one another. He will make a report to the Supreme Court next week and may then also take some action in the matter.

"I have not decided what action to take," said Andrews this morning. "The papers in the case were sent to me by the Supreme Court next Monday or Tuesday I shall send a reply to the court, giving my reasons for whatever I may decide to do in the matter. I understand that a decision in the case is expected before then.

The Supreme Court's last adjournment was to next Monday, and a new session will begin then. A large number of cases remain undecided.

## WILL BE AN EXCITING RACE

Irmgard and Annie Johnson, Crack Sailing Vessels, Will Start Tomorrow Morning For San Francisco.

There will be a most interesting race to San Francisco to start tomorrow. The supremacy of the sailing fleet may be determined by the voyage. The contest will be between the bark Annie Johnson and the barkentine Irmgard. Both of them sail tomorrow morning for the Coast with full loads of sugar.

They will leave within an hour of each other. The Irmgard will sail first. She is scheduled to depart at 9 o'clock. She will have 1,100 tons of sugar and carry three passengers. Passengers are requested to be aboard the vessel at 8:30 o'clock, as the tug will come alongside about that time.

The Annie Johnson is to sail within an hour of the Irmgard. Ten o'clock is the hour set for the departure of the Johnson. The Johnson will have about 1,500 tons of sugar. She will take eight passengers. The voyage of the two vessels will be more than usually interesting.

Special interest is attached to the race, because there is much rivalry between the vessels. Both are acknowledged to be about the speediest sailing vessels in the Coastwise trade. Up to last month the Irmgard held the record over the Johnson. The Irmgard came down from San Francisco to this port in 9 days and 16 hours. But last month the Johnson took this record away and incidentally established a new record. The Johnson made the run in 8 days and 16 hours, arriving here May 22. She therefore beat the Irmgard by a full 24 hours. Weather conditions were remarkably favorable for the Johnson on that trip.

The best record from the islands to San Francisco was made some years ago by the bark Rhoderic Dhu. She went up in 9 days and 12 hours from Hilo. From Honolulu the best record is 10 days. This time was made by the brigantine Consuelo.

## JAPS PAID IN FULL

BONDS ACCEPTED BY THE MIKADO'S SUBJECTS IN PAYMENT OF THEIR SHARE OF FIRE CLAIMS AWARDS, SETTLING THE JAPANESE CLAIMS IN FULL—OSAKI TAKES \$66,000 IN BONDS.

Sixty-six thousand dollars' worth of fire claims bonds were given out yesterday to S. Ozaki, assignee for 2,500 Japanese claimants, paying practically all of the Japanese claims in full. The Japs decided to take bonds and bank them as other claimants are doing and at the present rate the fire claims proposition will soon be a thing of the past, as far as the government is concerned, except for taking up the bonds.

The 2,500 Japanese claimants all got their bonds on 45 warrants. Their claims were all assigned to Ozaki, and most of them followed in succession on the records of the court. Hence it was possible to draw warrants for them in lumps, by numbers. Ozaki presented himself at the Auditor's office and in about half an hour the whole matter was settled up and he went away with a warrants for 66 bonds of one thousand each. For the \$66,000, the Japs get in cash a little less than \$60,000. They are paid in full and have no further claim on the government.

Up to date \$130,000 of the issue of \$326,000 has been paid out, or something like half of the bonds. The others are going well and it is thought that most of them will soon find their way into the banks. Ozaki's lot was the largest single lot that will be given out, however. The Chinese claimants all hold their awards individually, and they will have to form huis, besides having difficulty over identifications.

Kaumakapili church, which has the largest single award, has also taken bonds for its pro rata. About \$8,800 constituted the church's share of bonds, and the bank took nine bonds of \$1,000 each, paying the balance to the government in cash. The church, it is stated, will keep its bonds, not discounting them as other claimants are doing.

## REVIEWED THE SOLDIER BOYS.

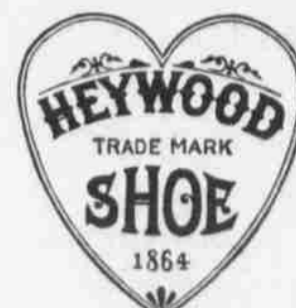
