SUGAR SLUMP CAUSED FAILURE

A PARISIAN MAGNATE FAILS FOR THREE MILLIONS AND CARRIES DOWN TWO BROKERS' FIRMS.

PARIS, July 21.—A panic was caused on the Bourse today by the announcement that Jules Jaluzot had failed to meet his engagements in the sugar market.

Jaluzot is a member of the Chamber of Deputies. He was the founder of Magasins Du Printemps, and is the managing director of the company which owns a great dry goods establishment at the angle of the Boulevard Haussmann and the Rue du Harve.

According to some financial authorities, the great slump in sugar is the outcome of a battle between Jaluzot and the "bears," the latter forcing down prices in spite of the spring indications that this year's best crop will be comparatively light.

Sheriff Brown testified that Kellett had admitted that he used the missing money for his own purposes. He had lost it in opium deals.

County Sheriff Brown was called to testify to Kellett's alleged confession at the police station. Magoon objected to the testimony on the ground that it had been given under a promise by Brown that Kellett could go free if he made a satisfactory explanation.

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MOORE, TRENT AND THE PAYROLL

TREASURER WILL NOT SAY WHETHER HE HAS ANY EVIDENCE OR NOT.

"No, I have not yet finished my examination of the garbage pay-rolls," said Supervisor Moore this morning, "but I will be through very shortly and have my report prepared."

"There is nothing to say yet," he answered. "Some people seem to think that it is my object to seek to blacken somebody, but that is not it at all. I want to see if certain things were done in a certain way, and if so, why. I know of nothing which may not be open to an explanation."

"Says the Advertiser this morning: Evidence in the hands of County Treasurer Trent, which is, of course, at the disposal of the Grand Jury, shows that Keanu worked but 15 days."

The statement is made in connection with the charge that the man named Keanu, was credited wrongfully on the garbage pay-rolls with having worked 22 days.

The Treasurer was asked this morning by The Star if it was correct that he had such evidence.

"Are you the Grand Jury?" he asked. In receipt of a reply which was perforce in the negative, the Treasurer stated that he had handed over the whole matter to the Board of Supervisors who had appointed a committee to look into it.

"Then the statement that you have such evidence is incorrect?" he was asked.

"I am not talking for publication," he replied. "Did you authorize the statement in the Advertiser to the effect that you had the evidence referred to?"

Again came the reply that he was not talking for publication.

It was pointed out to the Treasurer that he had either told the Advertiser that he had the evidence; had allowed the Advertiser to go through his papers and find the evidence; or else that the Advertiser was making a mis-statement.
