WILCOX FUNERAL
A LARGE ONE

REMAINS OF THE LATE LEADER
INTERRED IN THE KING STREET
CEMETERY.

The remains of the late R. W. Wilcox
were followed to the King street ceme-
tery yesterday afternoon by a long pro-
cession of mourners. Services were
held in the Catholic Cathedral at two
o'clock, an immense crowd gathering
to attend the services. The streets were
lined with people who had gathered to
watch the procession.

The procession started at 3:45 headed
by a platoon of police. There was
nothing spectacular about it and the
line moved slowly along without music
save for the notes of a cornet, snare
and life, and the sounds of a big and
little drum. There were two or three
hundred Hawaiian women marching
and the hearse was drawn by a couple
of hundred poles. At the cemetery
the government band met the pro-
cession and played funeral music while
the remains were carried to the grave.
Bishop Albert conducted the final ser-
vices. The crowd in and about the
cemetery was an immense one. The order

CIRCUIT COURT NOTES.

Judge De Holt on Saturday overruled
the demurrer in the case of the Kapi-
olani Estate vs. Mary H. Atcherly, al-
lowing the defendant fifteen days in
which to answer.
A demurrer has been filed by the
trustees of the estate of the late James
Campbell, in the suit brought against
them by Kallau (w.), who claims to
have been forced to sign a deed by
Campbell, nearly ten years ago.
In the case of S. M. Ballou vs. the
Mutual Telephone Company a demur-
rer has been filed by the defendant.

NATIONAL MILITIA LAW.

Col. Jones of the National Guard has
received from the War Department
copies of a militia law which the Ter-
ritorial legislature is asked to enact.
A similar law is sent to every state and

territory, with a view to having the na-
tional guards all on the same basis.
The law does not differ materially from
that which the Hawaiian legislature
recently enacted.

marriage took place at the coast and
the bride and groom are expected here
at any time. Dr. Mackay practiced
